FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and All in the St James Community

BRINGING THEM HOME

A beautiful event occurred today at school. The College was privileged to host the 20th anniversary of the 'Bringing Them Home' Report and the 50th anniversary of the successful Referendum that included Aboriginal People in the Commonwealth Census for the first time.

Both of these landmark events drew the much-needed attention of European Australians to the appalling treatment of the Indigenous Peoples of this country for well over 200 years since European occupation.

Today, in a special ceremony in the Hall, we joined in prayer and reflection with Elders, dignitaries and students from visiting schools, together in solidarity, knowing that we all are intrinsically connected through our presence on this land so precious to the ancient stories and spirituality of its original inhabitants.

Many Aboriginal people in Australia have experienced the tragedy of disconnection with land and spirituality. They were displaced as a result of past misguided and inhumane Government policies. It is important that we all take time to reflect on such events and to remember the significance of 'home' and all that it stands for. At St James, so many of our students have grown up in refugee camps as a result of war and political destabilization. Others have risked their lives to escape horrific personal circumstances and yearn for acceptance here. Families send a child here to St James who may need disability support in a caring and supportive environment, others because they have heard that in this unique school their child may find a place of welcome and belonging. There are even some whose experience of 'home' is anything but welcoming and nurturing.

Today's commemoration is foremost about Australia's First People whose dispossession and disconnection with land and heritage is the tragic story of this country, a story that affects all of us today.

Aboriginal People are great sharers, they are great talkers and they are the most beautiful welcomers.

Surely it is possible for us all to *share* this great land respectful of its original ownership, to *talk* about and appreciate all our stories, and to open our arms in *welcome* to all those who need a place to call home.

CULTURAL NIGHT

Next Friday evening, the College presents its annual Cultural Night.

There has been much frenetic activity around the classrooms during lunchtimes as groups of students from all cultural backgrounds rehearse their items in preparation for the big night. The event has become a much-loved tradition in the school, a celebration of who we are and a strong statement to the community of the value of inclusivity.

The show commences at 7pm in the College Hall. There will be a nominal entry fee of \$5 to help cover the cost of lighting and sound. Drinks and snacks will also be on sale during interval.

Next week there are some significant anniversaries of events important to Indigenous history and in particular, issues of reconciliation. Today is the anniversary of the release of the *Bringing them home report*, published by the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission in 1997. This report not only provided the agenda for responsible reform in Australian Government Indigenous policy, it has provided an extensive archive of oral histories detailing experiences of families that were separated due to policies of assimilation.

Friday May 26 is National Sorry Day. The first National Sorry Day was commemorated on May 29 in 1998 – exactly twelve months after the tabling of the *Bringing them home report* in Federal Parliament. Sorry Day is not just about expressing regret for past experiences, it is also intended to celebrate the beginning of new understandings. “Today we acknowledge the past hurt and its consequences, make a public apology for this practice, and promise to move forward together on the journey of healing” (Prime Minister Kevin Rudd, February 13, 2008).

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is an annual celebration from 27 May – 3 June and is a time for all Australians to reflect on our shared histories, contributions and achievements. The week is framed by two key events in Australia’s history which provide strong symbols of the aspirations for reconciliation.

Saturday, May 27 marks the 50th anniversary of the Referendum of 1967 that granted citizen rights to Indigenous Australians. This referendum was passed with the highest yes vote (91%) of any Australian Referendum.

On 3 June, 1992, 25 years ago, the High Court of Australia delivered its landmark Mabo decision which legally recognised that Indigenous people had a special relationship to the land—that existed prior to colonisation and still exists today. This recognition paved the way for Indigenous land rights called Native Title. It is remembered as MABO Day.

Indigenous issues are a formal part of the curriculum across St James College. Aboriginal spirituality is part of studies in comparative religions in Studies of Religion; social justice issues as they pertain to indigenous populations are studied in Religion and Ethics; indigenous history is studied in History and indigenous cultural achievements are examined in many contexts. Perhaps more importantly, particularly in National Reconciliation Week, indigenous perspectives are constantly sought and that their viewpoint is not lost in the clamor of louder and more powerful voices.

I would like to thank Ms Nikki Carpenter who accompanied the students for me, to Ms Genevieve O'Sullivan who helped with the gifts and organization, the wonderful student who represented St James so beautifully, and the wonderful staff and students at the Lady Cilento Children's Hospital. I include a report written by Tara McKenzie who was one of our wonderful students who took part in the visit.



This week, four students went to the Lady Cilento Children's Hospital. Myself and the other girls had so much fun. We met many bright boys and girls and we had the great pleasure of giving them a gift that they can give to Mum, Nana or someone special for Mothers' Day.

The kids showed me that every down has an up and that you just have to see the bright side to things, and keep on going. The way the kids' faces lit up was heart-warming. Some of the children had brothers and sisters that were sick, or it was themselves. We heard their stories and some of the kids read their special cards for Mum to us.

The teachers were so kind and loving towards the kids. We could see that even the school brought happiness to them in a difficult time.


